OVERVIEW

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) announced more than \$168,430 in grants to 18 National Wildlife Refuge Friends organizations across the country to support on-the-ground projects, capacity building work and peer-to-peer conferences within the refuge system. Grant recipients will provide more than \$284,450 in match for a total conservation impact of \$452,880.

The grants were awarded through the National Wildlife Refuge Friends Grant Program, a collaborative effort between NFWF, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Enbridge. The program provides competitive grants that enable Friends organizations to develop and implement conservation projects, strengthen organizational capacity and skills, meet local refuge challenges, and build community recognition and support.
