Pascagoula River Corridor Acquisitions

This project will acquire more than 3,400 acres of floodplain habitat and riparian buffer along the Pascagoula River corridor to benefit various wading birds, waterfowl, and fish, as well as downstream water quality. The properties are located in Jackson County, Mississippi, along the Lower Pascagoula River corridor near the confluence of the Red and Black Creeks and include significant riparian habitat and bottomland hardwood wetlands on the eastern and western sides of the Pascagoula River floodplain.

Much of the Lower Pascagoula River corridor is already protected and these parcels represent some of the remaining unprotected lands within the floodplain in Jackson County. Land conservation through fee simple acquisition continues to play an important role in restoration of the Mississippi coastal landscape.

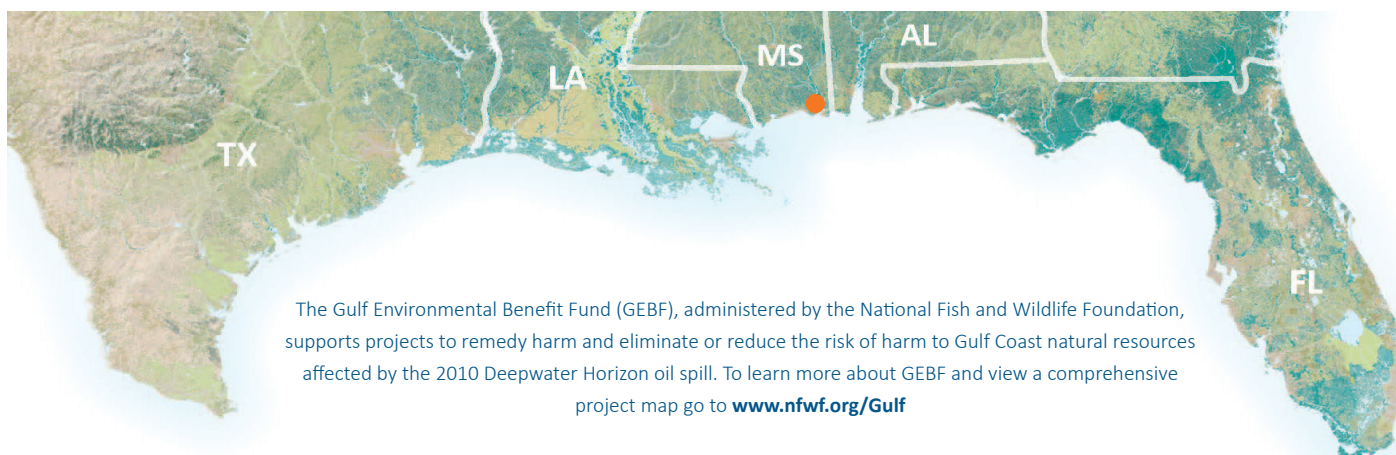
