BACKGROUND

The Lower Mississippi Alluvial Valley Restoration Fund (LMAV Fund) launched in 2017 to restore, enhance and maintain bottomland hardwood forests and wetlands, and promote aquatic connectivity on private and public lands to improve habitat for forest breeding birds, waterfowl and terrestrial and aquatic species, and safeguard water quality.

The program has awarded three rounds of grants totaling \$6.8 million in grant funding, generating \$6.1 million in grantee matching funds, and resulting in a total conservation impact of more than \$12.9 million. These projects are anticipated to restore more than 33,000 acres of bottomland hardwood forest, enhance more than 12,000 acres of existing bottomland hardwood habitat, restore and improve hydrologic function to 28,000 acres of wetlands and floodplains, and protect nearly 36,000 acres of bottomland habitats with conservation easements.

The LMAV Fund is a public-private partnership supported with Federal funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service and the U.S. Forest Service, and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and private funding from



International Paper's Forestland Stewards Partnership, the Walton Family Foundation, and American Forest Foundation's Southern Woods At-Risk Wildlife partnership.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The LMAV Fund will award grants within the Lower Mississippi Alluvial Valley region of Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, and Tennessee. Goals of the LMAV Fund include:

- Establish and enhance bottomland hardwood forests to benefit wildlife and improve water quality
- Restore and enhance wetland forest and floodplain hydrology
- Improve aquatic habitat connectivity
- Protect bottomland forest and wetland
 habitats through conservation easements
- Expand and coordinate private landowner technical assistance and outreach
