Dauphin Island East End Beach and Dune Restoration- Phase II

This project will implement the beach and dune restoration project currently being designed and permitted under Phase I of this project. The construction component will restore approximately 1.5-miles of beach shoreline and approximately 85 acres of beach and dune habitat. These features will protect an additional 50 acres of beach and dune habitat as well as a maritime forest and a freshwater lake within the Audubon Bird Sanctuary previously enhanced using GEBF funds. These habitats serve as important foraging and nesting habitat for migratory, and beach nesting birds.

Dauphin Island is a strategically significant 14-mile barrier island in the northern Gulf of Mexico, serving as the only barrier island providing protection to the state of Alabama's coastal resources. It provides valuable habitat for living coastal and marine resources and helps to maintain ecological conditions in Mississippi Sound, which is critical to the

resilience of its fisheries, oysters, and seagrass beds. The island is also a significant trans-Gulf migratory bird stopover area and provides habitat to numerous beach nesting birds directly impacted by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill.



This restoration will benefit seabirds, such as the least terns pictured.
