#### Delaware Watershed Conservation Fund 2023 Grants: Full-proposal Project Narrative Template

**Instructions:** Save this document on your computer and complete the narrative in the format provided. The narrative may not exceed ten pages, and smaller grants with fewer partners may be as few as five pages. Please retain the outline format below, but you may delete italicized instructions. Once complete, upload this document into the online application as instructed.

Things to consider while drafting your narrative:

- 1. How will watershed communities benefit?
- 2. How will fish and wildlife communities benefit?
- 3. How will results be used to ultimately enhance conservation action on the ground?
- 4. What immediate challenges or difficult questions will this project address?

For applicants seeking implementation grants, describe the shovel-ready conservation or restoration project. Thoughtfully detail the long-term sustainability and impacts of the project and transferability to other parts of the watershed.

For applicants seeking funding for capacity building, fully explain the capacity-related problem to be solved, why it is timely, and how the project will help the organization(s) ultimately address the goals and strategies of the Framework. Describe how methods developed and lessons learned from projects will have broad benefits within the watershed.

For applicants seeking planning grants, rationalize planning needs. Define the planning goals, how planning will set-thestage for future implementation, and where/how future funding for project implementation will be obtained. Explain how appropriate experts and partners will be engaged throughout planning and roles they will play during project implementation.

For applicants seeking funding for research, monitoring, and evaluation, describe how anticipated data and outcomes will contribute to broader conservation improvement in the watershed—beyond discrete project delivery and performance assessment.

## 4. Incorporating Community Engagement Into Your Proposal

#### **Direct Community Engagement**

DWCF seeks to support projects that increase equitable access and community engagement – especially for underserved and nature-deprived communities – with the goal of providing opportunities for residents to experience the benefits of a healthy Delaware River Watershed.

The DWCF will prioritize proposals that directly and meaningfully engage communities throughout project development and implementation. Successful proposals will satisfy the evaluation criteria outlined in the "Partnership and Community Impact" section on page 10. Some examples of direct and meaningful community engagement include:

Projects are community led or co-created with community members

- Project team includes members representing and/or a part of the target community
- Directly engaging in specific cultural activities with the community
- Empowering community members with knowledge or decision-making authority
- Active engagement strategies such as workshops, classroom activities, field trips and volunteer opportunities

Creating jobs in the target community, performing job training, technical assistance and certifications

Priority will be given to projects that were developed through community input and co-design processes.

#### **OVERVIEW**

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), in partnership with the U.S Fish & Wildlife Service, is soliciting proposals through the Delaware Watershed Conservation Fund (DWCF) to conserve, restore, and connect people with fish and wildlife habitat in the Delaware River watershed. The DWCF will award matching grants of \$75,000 to \$1,500,000 each to conserve, restore, and protect habitats on public and private land, across rural, urban, and Tribal areas, that contribute to the overall health of the Delaware River watershed—as well as benefit the quality of life and economic

#### APPENDIX A

#### Priority At-Risk Species, ESA, and NFWF Business Plan Species

Proposals addressing priority At-Risk Species (ARS), Endangered Species Act (ESA) listed species, or NFWF business plan priority species listed below will be considered most competitive if they incorporate the eligible high-priority actions identified in Table A1 and are consistent with conservation or recovery plans, where applicable, or with actions listed for the species within <u>state</u> wildlife action plans, and <u>NFWF's Delaware River Watershed Business Plan</u>. Please note the linked update of the 2017 Delaware River Watershed Business Plan. Please note the linked approval by NFWF's Board of Directors in March 2023.

Applications should provide narrative, with citations, as to how the proposed activities will contribute toward the improved conservation of the priority species, how efficacy will be measured or monitored, and how any potential adverse impacts will be addressed and mitigated. Letters of support from state wildlife agencies and prior coordination with agency contacts for state-listed species are highly encouraged.

To identify the potential for rare species or ecosystems on project sites, applicants may find the following tools useful for planning purposes (note that formal environmental review may also be required):U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Information for Planning and Consultation (IPaC) tool. New York State Environmental Resource Mapper, Pennsylvania Conservation Explorer, Pennsylvania Wildlife Action Plan Conservation Opportunity Area Tool, New Jersey's Landscape Project Mapper, Connecting Habitat Across NJ (CHANJ), and information about Environmental Review in Delaware.

# WHO SHOULD PROVIDE LETTERS OF SUPPORT?

- Any organization providing in-kind or cash match contributions towards the match amount listed in the proposal
- Landowners or site managers if project location has been decided and implementation will occur on a site that the applicant does not own
- Community-level partners (municipalities, NGOs, community organizations, community leaders)
- Local, state or federal government agencies if involved in project design review or other participation

# 7. Letters of Support Best Practices

### WHAT SHOULD BE INCLUDED IN A LETTER OF SUPPORT?

- All letters of support should include:
  - the Easygrants five-digit proposal number
  - the project title
  - the name of the applicant organization
- For LOS indicating match contributions:
  - Amount to be contributed and type (in-kind/cash)
  - When the contribution will be made
  - Confirmation that the contribution has not been used to meet any other federal program match or cost share requirements
- For LOS indicating significant partnership, agency involvement, etc:
  - Integral connection between organization writing letter and the project goals and objectives
  - Interest or commitment to implementation on land
  - Additional benefits that the project will provide to organization's mission
