



- Funded projects will address one or more of the following strategies:
 - 1. Restore / improve grassland, sagebrush, wetland, or coastal habitats for birds
 - 2. Conserve key habitats for birds
 - 3. Conduct research or monitoring on priority bird population(s)







2023 Funding Opportunity

- \$1.1 million available
 - Typical grant range \$50,000 \$275,000; average grant \$150,000+

- Key dates:
 - Full proposals due: July 26, 2023 at 11:59 PM Eastern Time
 - Award announcements: Late November

- Eligible applicants
 - ✓ Non-profit organizations
 - ✓ State, tribal & local governments
 - Educational institutions



1) Restore / improve grassland, sagebrush, wetland, and coastal bird habitat

- Expand or improve habitat connectivity, quality, or patch size
- Remove encroaching woody vegetation that negatively impacts grassland-nesting or sagesteppe habitat nesting birds
- Reduce invasive species' impact on bird habitats
- Restore wetland functions that benefit birds
- Restore important breeding, wintering or stopover sites.





2) Conserve Key Habitats for Birds

- Conservation easement acquisitions
 - Parcels with important habitat connectivity functions, or
 - Important breeding, wintering or stopover sites
- Change since 2022: Fee title acquisitions are generally not allowed for grant funding, but they may be included as match.





3) Conduct Research or Monitoring on Priority Bird Population(s)

- Increase the quality or quantity of bird population data that can be used to fill gaps and inform current and future habitat management decisions.
- Data should be useful at specific sites or in assessing bird use of habitats across breeding, wintering, or stopover ranges.

Matching Contributions


- Minimum 1:1 match required; at least 50% non-federal
- Match sources:
 - ✓ Cash
 - ✓ In-kind contributions of staff
 - Materials and services donated
 - ✓ Volunteer time
 - ✓ Cost of land acquisition/easement
 - Allowable indirect costs not covered by grant funding
 - Other tangible contributions to project goals



Match

Match must be:

- Verifiable from the grantee's records
- Not included as contributions for any other award
- Necessary and reasonable for accomplishment of project or program objectives
- Allowable costs based on the program and funding source guidelines
- Committed directly to the project and must be used within the period of performance
- Note: NFWF will not consider the portion of landowner expenses required as cost share to obtain funding on Farm Bill projects as partner contributions to match





Period of Performance

- Start date should be no earlier than December 1, 2023.
- End date within 36 months of start date.
- Match must be spent between project start and end dates.
- Significant achievements are expected during year one.



Compliance

- Applicants should budget time and resources to obtain the needed approvals.
 - National Environmental Policy Act
 - Endangered Species Act
 - National Historic Preservation Act

- Award payments are primarily <u>reimbursable</u>. Projects may request funds for reimbursement at any time after completing a signed agreement with NFWF. Or contact the NFWF program manager to discuss.
- Documentation of compliance must be approved prior to initiating activities that disturb or alter habitat or other features of the project site(s)

Proposal Narrative – Community Impact

Describe the community(ies) where the project will take place, who will benefit from the project, and how they were or will be engaged in project development and implementation. Provide demographic information on the community(ies), including but not limited to age, race and ethnicity, poverty rates.

Two-part question:


- 1) Describe community characteristics of the project area and identify any communities impacted.
 - Use demographic data to document (poverty statistics, demographic records)
 - This data can be found using Census data, State data centers, EJ Screen, and other sources
- 2) Describe outreach and community engagement activities for project development and implementation

Letters of support welcome but not required.



Proposal Uploads - Applicant Demographic Information Form

- The information you provide will <u>not</u> be shared with proposal reviewers and will <u>not</u> be considered when making grant decisions.
- The Foundation will <u>not</u> share identifying information about any particular entity or project.
- While the form is a required upload, applicants can opt out of providing the information within the form itself
 - If your organization does not collect this information or if you have provided NFWF with this information in the last 12 months, you can opt out.
- The information provided on this excel form will be kept confidential, the Foundation may share its anonymized aggregate findings as appropriate with its staff, Board of Directors, funding partners, and publicly on its website or through other media.






Metrics

- Select only the most relevant metrics.
- Starting Values <u>must be set to 0.</u>
- Metrics have been revised. Pay careful attention to metrics instructions in the RFP and provide metrics notes and proposal narrative as directed:
 - "Acreage of project footprint" recommended for all proposals.
 - Habitat restoration metrics used both establishment and enhancement of habitat, so specify in the notes the landcover type before and after restoration.





Application Assistance – Easygrants Tips

- If you've never used Easygrants (https://easygrants.nfwf.org/) before, create your login TODAY and familiarize yourself with the system. View the pre-recorded instructional webinar.
- Turn off your browser's pop-up blockers.
- Download the "Tip Sheet" (available on the RFP webpage) and use it as a reference to complete each field of the proposal.
- Save often!
- DO NOT mail physical letters of support to NFWF. They must be digital copies uploaded into the online proposal.
- Provide a phone number in your Easygrants account. Keep your email and proposal contact information up-to-date.
