PROGRAM PRIORITIES


- Conserve critical habitats for birds, fish, plants and wildlife

RESULTS TO DATE

Acres for America has far surpassed its original goal to permanently conserve one acre of wildlife habitat for every acre of land developed by Walmart Stores – approximately 100,000 acres as of 2005.

Since its inception, the Acres for America program has supported projects that have:

- Protected more than 2 million acres an area about twice the size of Rhode Island
- Connected over 10 million acres of protected lands to support landscape-scale conservation and wildlife migration
- Funded 132 projects in 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico
- Provided nearly \$4 million in emergency response funding to protect fish and wildlife that were immediately threatened by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in 2010 and Hurricane Sandy in 2012
- Restored urban lands and habitats, and connected youth to the outdoors by investing more than \$1.8 million in community-based projects located in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Diego, Denver, Bridgeport, Portland (OR), Albuquerque and Washington, D.C.
