OVERVIEW

Acres for America is the leading public-private land conservation partnership in the United States. In 2005, NFWF and Walmart teamed up to establish the Acres for America program to conserve lands of national significance, restore critical fish and wildlife habitat, and benefit people and local economies.

PROGRAM PRIORITIES

- Conserve critical habitats for birds, fish, plants and wildlife
- Connect existing protected lands to unify wild places and protect migration routes
- Provide access for people to enjoy the outdoors
- Ensure the future of local economies that depend on forestry, ranching and recreation

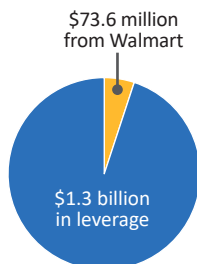

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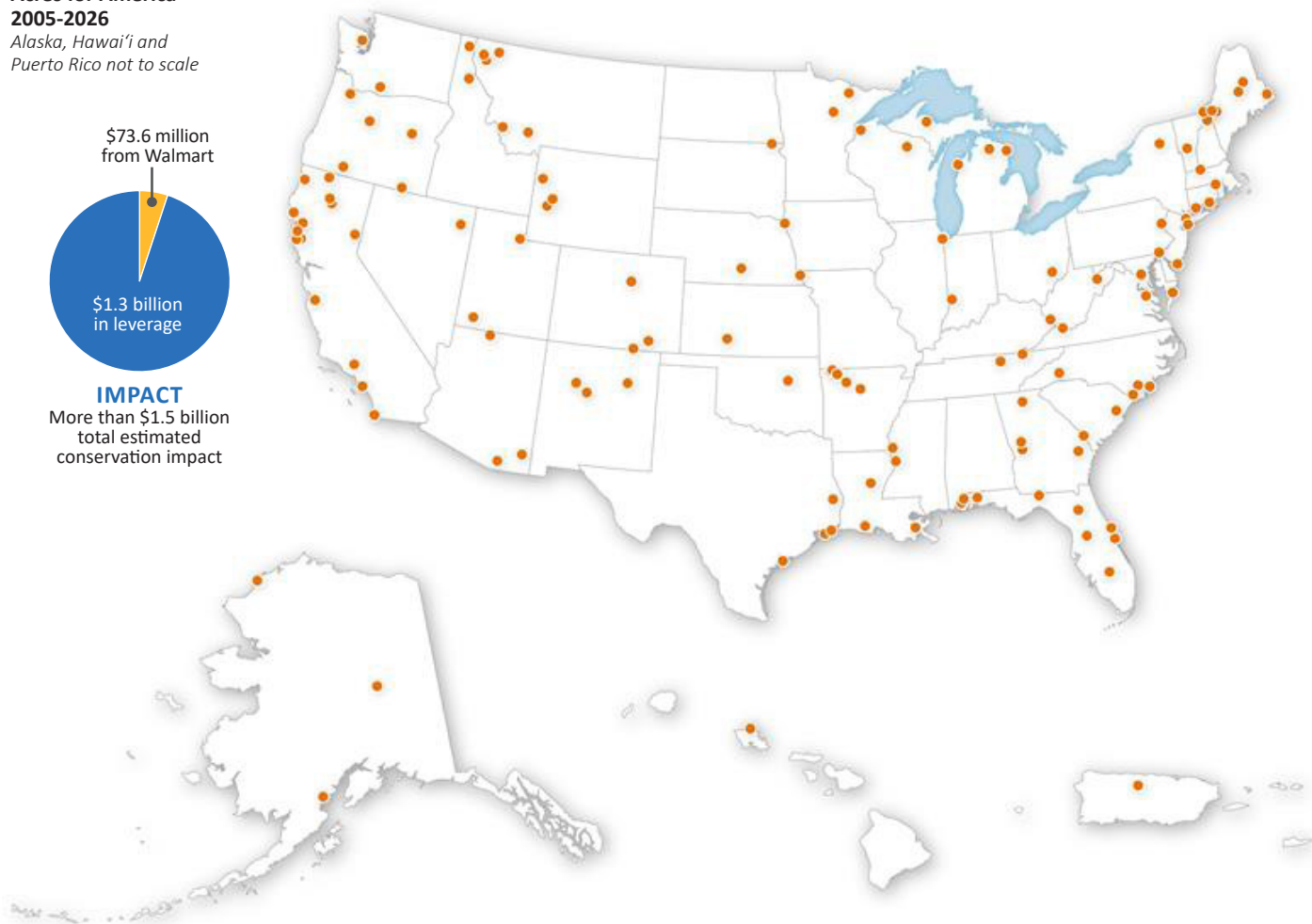

IMPACT

RESULTS TO DATE

Acres for America has far surpassed its original 2005 goal of permanently conserving 100,000 acres.

Since its inception, the Acres for America program has supported projects that have:

- Protected more than 2 million acres – an area about twice the size of Rhode Island
- Connected over 10 million acres of protected lands to support landscape-scale conservation and wildlife migration
- Funded more than 130 projects in 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico
- Provided nearly \$4 million in emergency response funding to protect fish and wildlife that were immediately threatened by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in 2010 and Hurricane Sandy in 2012
- Restored urban lands and habitats, and connected youth to the outdoors by investing more than \$1.8 million in community-based projects located in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Diego, Denver, Bridgeport, Portland (OR), Albuquerque and Washington, D.C.
